Curriculum Revisions and Additions

Remaining responsive to the challenges brought about by the changes in the Philippine educational system, the University, through the Office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs and the Academic Council Standing Committee for Curriculum and Syllabus conducted a review of the present curricula and syllabi being used in the University and came up with the following results/recommendations:

- 1. Finalized course name with aligned course description;
- 2. Clearly defined number of units for lecture and laboratory as prescribed in the CHED Memorandum;
- 3. Identification of pre-requisite and corequisite courses;
- 4. Inclusion of two additional foreign language (Asian and European) in the curriculum;

Implementation of CMO No. 38, s2010 for the Offering of Psychology Program

In compliance to CHED Memorandum Order No. 38, series of 2010 regarding the Policies and Standards for Undergraduate Programs in Psychology, the University fully implemented the provisions of the said CMO effective First Semester of AY 2014-2015.

To fully abide by the provisions of the CMO, clustering sessions were conducted among faculty members who handle the core courses of the program. The sessions aimed to synchronize the subjects with those prescribed in the CMO. In addition to the efforts to further improve its Psychology program, the University sought the construction of a new building for the College of Social and Behavioral Science for CY 2014.

CHED RQUAT Evaluation of BPSU Programs across Campuses

To guarantee its capacity to constantly deliver excellent quality of relevant education to its students and the community, the University requested the Commission on Higher Education (CHED) to conduct a monitoring and evaluation visit to its non-accredited programs for the issuance of Certificate of Program Compliance.

Accreditation

As means to identify the strengths and weakness of its curricular programs and to address major and minor concerns, the University subjects its curricular programs for accreditation. In exerting such efforts, the University now has twenty (28) accredited programs with accreditation status. Out of the 106 curricular program of the University, three (3) were granted Level III Phase 2 status; twelve (12) with Level II status; eleven (11) with Level I status; and two (2) underwent Preliminary Survey Visit in November 2013 and December 2014.

Admission and Enrollment

As reflected in Table 01 (Number of Programs per Major per College as of AY 2014-2015), the University has 106 curricular offerings, of which majority has been identified significant to the country's economic development. Through the directives of the Commission on Higher Education and the University's enthusiasm to be on a par with international educational institutions, its curricular programs are continually reviewed and updated to make them constantly relevant and responsive to the dynamic changes in the local and global industry.

Up to present, the people from the province of Bataan continue to patronize the programs and services of the University despite the growing number of tertiary education institutions in Bataan and in the nearby provinces. Table 03 shows the admission data for three consecutive years. Increase in the number of applicants is observed every year, and for the admissions for AY 2014-2015 the Admissions Office had to conduct extended admissions to accommodate students who wish to become part of BPSU.

Enrollment

For AY 2014-2015, the total number of students reached 17,869 during the first semester. In terms of program level, 87% are enrolled in baccalaureate degree programs, 5.49% in pre-baccalaureate programs, and 4.28% in technical-vocational courses. The increasing awareness on the importance and necessity of obtaining advanced degrees also boosted the enrollment in the University's Graduate School during AY 2014-2015.

Based on the detailed Enrollment Report, the top five programs with the highest enrollment are Bachelor of Secondary Education, Bachelor of Elementary Education, Industrial Technology, Bachelor of Science in Mechanical Engineering, and Bachelor of Science in Business Administration. Programs with the least population are Midwifery, entrepreneurship, Computer Secretarial, Certificate of Technology and Management Information Systems.

It is also during this Academic Year that the Abucay and Orani Campuses stopped offering high school program.

Graduation

After a series of deliberation and evaluation of academic requirements, the University endorsed for approval of the BPSU Board of Regents the 2,837 candidates for graduation for Academic Year 2013-2014. However, Table 04 indicates that only 2,802 graduated for the said academic year.

As reported by the Office of the Vice-President for Academic Affairs, the graduation for AY 2013-2014 consisted of 45.28% males and 54.72% females. it was also observed that for the AY 2013-2014 Graduation showed an increase in the number of graduates from industrial and computer-related programs (BS Hotel and Restaurant Management and BS Information Technology: Net and Web Applications).

In terms of the non-degree programs of the University, the two-year Associated in Computer Technology ranked first among the non-baccalaureate programs as it composed 4.27% of the total graduation population. The said program is currently being offered in the three satellite campuses of the University.

Licensure Examinations

The results of licensure examinations, being one of the indicators of the HEI's capacity to deliver quality education are being constantly monitored by the University. Such monitoring proved to be helpful in assessing the curricula and implementing adjustments to ensure responsiveness and relevance.

As shown in Figure 01, BPSU's performance in licensure examinations in Year 2014 improved as results showed the BPSU managed to surpass the national passing rates with some of its graduates topping the examinations. Mark Joseph B. Mirania with an average of 85% ranked fourth in the Licensure Examination for Architects on June 2014. BEEd graduate Cris V. Regala also gave pride to the University as PRC named him as one of the 10th placers by garnering 87.40% rating in the August 2014 Licensure Examination for Teachers (Elementary Level).

Going back to BPSU's Performance for three consecutive years, the data in Table 05 indicates that although some of its graduates manage to secure top places in various licensure examinations the University still needs to make improvements in some of its programs.





FACULTY

Faculty

For AY 2014-2015, the University's faculty population dropped to 459 compared to the previous year's population of 467. Aside from being conscious with the number of its faculty, the University's Office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs doubled its efforts to launch activities that will heighten the faculty members' passion to deliver their services excellently to realize the University's mission to provide quality education.

Highest Educational Attainment

Just as much the University continues to improve its curricula it also exerts double efforts to enable members of the faculty to meet the standards for instruction in tertiary education.

At present, the drive of the faculty members to upgrade their qualifications is motivated by CHED's policy on vertical articulation and the impending implementation of the K to 12 Curriculum. In Year 2014, the University continued to experience an increase in the number of faculty with master's and doctorate degrees.

Table 06 exhibits the progress of the University in terms of improving its faculty profile for the last three (3) years.

As exhibited in Table 06, there was a decline in the total number of faculty members. The decline, brought about by resignation and retirement, slightly affected the growth of the population of faculty with master's and doctorate degrees. However, the University remains hopeful that faculty with master's and doctorate degrees will increase as several are actively pursuing advanced studies and are about to get their degrees in the near future.

It is also worth mentioning that due to the University's initiatives to inform faculty on the recent policies in tertiary education such as the call of vertical alignment and the upcoming implementation of the K-12 curriculum, many of its faculty members have started to realign themselves and obtain advanced degrees to contribute to faculty profile improvement and quality of instruction.



Faculty Scholarships

Despite their hectic schedules, the University's faculty members never lose their determination to upgrade their educational background so that they may contribute to upholding the University's good reputation in terms of delivering quality education.

To fulfill their hopes and dreams of upgrading their educational background as well as their ranks, faculty members turned to the University's external linkages to avail scholarship grants. As shown in Table 07, fifteen (15) faculty members qualified are currently benefiting from the scholarship programs of external organizations.

Security of Tenure

Motivation results from the rewards attained by an individual through succeeding in their attempts to overcome a certain situation. To reinforce such positive behavior towards the performance of duties and responsibilities, the University implemented its Merit, Selection, and Promotion Plan.

The implementation of MSPP provided assurance to the faculty and employees that their efforts will be rewarded through provision of security of tenure or promotion; thus, it served as a motivating force for both teaching and non-teaching personnel to do their best in fulfilling their duties and responsibilities. Moreover, creation of plantilla positions is continuously sought to accommodate qualified employees for permanent positions.

Exigency of services prompted to University to hire more instructors on a contract of service or contractual basis. Majority of these instructors are bachelor's degree holders; hence, they are given the ultimatum that unless they obtain a relevant master's degree within three (3) years, they will not be considered for promotion, permanency, or even renewal of appointment.



Promotion of Faculty

Through the implementation of the Position Classification and Compensation Scheme for Faculty Positions (PCCSFP), services and accomplishments of faculty members are given the opportunity to be evaluated using the Common Criteria Evaluation developed by the Commission and Higher Education (CHED) and the Philippine Association of State Universities and Colleges (PASUC). The CCE made it possible for faculty members to upgrade their ranks and receive compensation that are tantamount to their efforts and contributions to the higher education institution.

Moreover, the University's Selection and Promotion Board regularly conducts ranking of faculty members to evaluate those who qualify to be promoted from contractual to permanent status. As of AY 2014-2015, six (6) contractual faculty members with Instructor I positions were granted permanent/plantilla faculty positions as they met the criteria provided in the University's Merit Selection and Promotion Program.

MJU Invites Faculty Scholar as Visiting Lecturer for Monk Graduate Students and Aid in ASEAN Economic Community 2015 Preparations

As part of the Memorandum of Agreement between BPSU and Maejo University (MJU) in Thailand, Dr. Mel S. Abas, a faculty detailed at the College of Engineering and Architecture, was invited to serve as visiting lecturer for MJU's Monk Graduate Students on February 26-March 31, 2014.

Furthermore, Dr. Abas will also be tapped to be part of MJU's Schoolof Administrative Studies staff tasked to prepare for the ASEAN Economic Community in 2015 when "Southeast Asia becomes one economic zone".

Dr. Abas has recently completed his doctorate program in MJU, which he achieved as a scholar under the terms of the MOA.

Civil Service Accredits Faculty Association

Pursuant to Executive Order No 180 dated 01 June 1987, The Civil Service Commission (CSC) has accredited the University's Faculty Association (FASSO) via Certificate of Accreditation No. 944 issued on 11 February 2014.

The FASSO's accreditation with the CSC officially renders it as the "sole and exclusive negotiating agent of the rank-and-file employees" of the University on "terms of conditions of employment not fixed by law".

The Certificate was awarded by the Commission before the FASSO officers and members in a simple program held on 24 March 2014. Immediately after, a short lecture was conducted by CSC on the limitations of the Collective Negotiation Agreement, and the importance of having a provision on cost-cutting schemes to be undertaken by the University and the association.

1st Language and Literature Colloquium

The University, through the English Cluster, conducted the First Language and Literature Colloquium on 28 August 2014 at the Crown Royale Hotel, City of Balanga, Bataan.

The said activity with the theme "Mapping the Landscape of Language and Literature Education and Research in BPSU" featured theses and dissertations completed in the last 20 years by the faculty. The said event likewise unlocked opportunities for the language and literature faculty members to share and listen to some of the research projects accomplished by the University.

Seminars and Trainings

The University continuously sends its faculty members to trainings and seminars of various levels to guarantee that improvement of their knowledge and skills so that they will be capable of delivering better quality of instruction and continue to contribute to the University's attainment of its goal to produce globally competitive professionals.

One of the indicators of a University's good reputation is the fact that residents of Bataan and nearby provinces choose to patronize its programs and services despite the presence of other higher education institutions.





As reported, the University obtained a total of 6,740 applicants for admission to the University for AY 2014-2015. The figures are relatively higher by 106% compared to the population of applicants for admission in AY 2013-2014 .The continued increase in the number of applicants can be attributed to the untiring efforts of the Office of Guidance and Admissions in advertising the current curricular programs of the University to the public and orienting interested individuals on the procedures for College Admission Test. Moreover, the University's vigilance towards the emerging needs of the global community also enables itself to immediately address the clamor of the community for the availability of relevant curricular programs.

Conscious in meeting its targets for AY 2014-2015, the Guidance and Admissions office struggled to accomplish the following activities on time:

- School-to-School Campaign;
- Dissemination of information on the requirements and procedures for College Admissions Test;
- Administration of the College
 Admissions Test and publication of
 CAT Results;
- Career Guidance

Scholarship and Financial Assistance

The cost of education continues to escalate as the years progress. Performing its role to save the public from ignorance, the University maintains its dedication towards searching for ways and means to sustain the education of students who are determined to finish their studies but are threatened by poverty.

Partnerships with scholarship-giving bodies have been sought and established to secure the students' capacity to meet the requirements of their courses and accomplish their aspirations to obtain a degree in their chosen field of expertise. As of AY 2014-2015, various scholarship benefactors of the University supported a total number of 3,649 students.

The University offers four (4) types of scholarship programs: private, government, externally-funded, and SUC-funded scholarships. Among the four categories, the government scholarship caters to the majority of scholars in the University. For AY 2014-2015, the number of students enjoying the benefits of government scholarships soared to 4,988 while SUC-funded scholarship comes next with a population of 935 scholars during the first semester and rose to 999 for the second semester. The number of private scholarship benefactors continues to increase; hence, more students are given the opportunity to enjoy the benefits of scholarship grants as well as the assurance that they will be able to finish their studies(for detailed information on Scholarships, see appendices).



PTT Awards Php271,130 Scholarship Grant

In fulfillment of its corporate social responsibility programs and advocacies, Petroleum Authority of Thailand or PTT, established the PTT Philippine Scholarship Program otherwise known as the PTT Tulong at Gabay Aral. Led by its President and Chief Operating Officer Mr. KhunWisarnChawalitanon, with the initiative of the PTT Philippines Foundation, Inc. and its president Mr. Paul Patricio J. Senador, the company extended a scholarship grant to the University amounting to Php271,130.00.

The partnership of BPSU and PTT commenced in May 2013 during the tree-planting project conducted at the Bataan National Park. Impressed by the leadership skills and drive of the BPSU student volunteers, PTT considered the prospect of granting scholarship privileges to ten (10) deserving stuents who are enrolled in engineering courses.

The Scholarship Program shall shoulder the total tuition fee, as well as allowance of scholars. Two (2) of the grantees will be awarded leadership scholarships while the remaining eight (8) slots will be based on academic standing.

Asiawide Land Development Corporation Scholarship

The University signed a Memorandum of Agreement with Asia Wide Land Specialist Development Corporation on 28 March 2014 and this paved the way for the former to offer scholarships to students enrolled under Civil Engineering and Accountancy programs.

Asiawide scholars get to enjoy the following benefits:

- 1. Free tuition fee
- 2. Free matriculation fees
- 3. Book allowance very semester

- 4. Monthly stipend
- Life Skill Session at least twice per semester
- 6. Practicum with monthly allowance for students in their higher years.

OWWA Scholarship Seminar

The BPSU Scholarship Office in partnership with the Overseas Workers Welfare Administration Regional Office 3 conducted a Scholarship Seminar on 26 November 2014 at the Audio Visual Room of the BPSU Main Campus. Sixty-six (66) scholars and seven (7) grantees participated in the seminar.

The objective of conducting the seminar is to help students to address issues on peer pressure and procrastination as the said problems have been identified among the major concerns of the students.

San Miguel Scholars Conference

Twenty (20) scholars from the College of Engineering and Architecture attended the two-day gathering of San Miguel scholars themed "Journey to Personal Mastery" at Subic Bay Metropolitan Authority on October 29-30, 2014.

The conference was held in order to develop the scholar's self-confidence, enhance their self-esteem, and improve their overall personality and commitment.





Awarding of ESGP-PA Scholarship Grant

With the presence of Dr. Caridad O. Abuan and other CHED Regional Office staff, the University awarded the scholarship grants under the ESGP-PA to 222 student-recipients enrolled in priority and accredited programs of the University on 21 July 2014 at the Bataan Youth Center, BPSU Balanga Campus.

The ESGP-PA scholarship grant provides the following financial benefits:

BPSU Jobs Fair 2014

On 14 February 2014, the Placement Services Office conducted its Annual Job Fair at the Sari-Gamit Covered Court of the BPSU Main Campus to provide opportunity for job seekers to apply for and secure jobs offered by national and international industries.

ESGP-PA scholars are required to render a return service of 2 years after graduation in the Philippines and must adhere to the scholarship policies to continue enjoying its benefits.

Counseling Services

The University aims for the holistic development of its students. Aside from providing quality instruction and an environment conducive to learning, the University's Guidance and Admissions Office also offers counseling services to students. The availability of counseling services proved to be beneficial in terms of helping the students realize their ambition, occupational goals, personal plans and aspirations. Furthermore, the Guidance and Admissions Office have extended assistance to several students who encounter problems concerning their studies as well as personal life.

As of AY 2014-2015, a total number of 1,176 students coming from the different campuses/colleges availed counseling services. Through the interventions provided by the office, the students were able to resolve their academic and personal problems and some were able to realize their potentials and interests.

Placement Services

Believing that knowledge is not only acquired within the four walls of an institution, students are given the opportunity to explore and experience the professional life through conducting regular activities that will contribute to enhancing their potentials.

Fifty seven (57) local companies and ten (10) international agencies participated in the event, and provided almost 3,000 job vacancies. The activity was attended by over 1,000 job seekers composed of alumni and graduating students. The activity was a success as some of the alumni and graduating students were interviewed and hired on the spot.

The activity was a success. As reported by the Placement Office, 240 were hired on the spot for international employment. 131 were identified as qualified, and 240 were scheduled for further interview.

<u>Pre-Employment Seminar for Graduating Students</u>

Aside from its annual job fair, the Placement Services Office also conducted its Pre-Employment Seminar for Graduating Students on December 1- 5, 2015.

The Pre-Employment Seminar catered to a total of 2,031 graduating students across the campuses of the University, of which 846 are males and 1,185 are females. The seminar aimed to orient the participants on the necessary preparations they have to make in order to give them the edge in landing good jobs in the future.



On-the-Job Training

Students, in order to understand and prepare for the challenges of professional life, must be immersed into actual work situations. In fulfillment of the requirements of curricular programs for 360 hours on-the-job training, the University established linkages with local, national and international industries for accommodation of its students for on-the-job training. For AY 2014-2015, the University deployed its senior students for on-the-job trainings to twenty-six (26) partner industries.

Partnerships with international companies such as Intrasource (M) SDN BHD in Malaysia and AgroStudies, Ltd. in Israel were sought; thus, making it possible for students of the College of Industrial Technology and BS Agriculture majors to undergo on-the-job training in international companies. For the Year 2014, eight (8) students of CIT and nineteen (19) BS Agriculture students were sent for OJT in Intrasource (M) SDN BHD and AgroStudies, Ltd., respectively.

While further polishing of skills and professional attitude of the students are delegated to partner industries, BPSU does its part by assigning OJT Coordinators. They are tasked to monitor the performance of the students through conducting periodic visits and coordinating with companies to ensure students' compliance on the company's policies and regulations and to safeguard their welfare.

Medical and Dental Services

With its awareness that health directly affects one's capacity to absorb ideas and apply what one has learned to actual situations, the University sees to it that both employees and students are provided access to quality medical and dental services.

According to the monthly reports of the various medical and dental services unit, as of Year 2014 majority of the cases dealt with were simple ailments. Other than dealing with common

medical and dental problems among employees and students, the other problems faced but were resolved immediately were the concerns on the maintenance and replenishment of health supplies and equipment; sanitation inside school grounds, and water safety.

Aside from providing health care services within the campuses of the University, the medical teams are required to be present during sports events and other activities in the University to provide immediate response when emergencies strike and to look after the health of the representatives of the University. As means to ensure the health of the members of the BPSU community, the University, through the Administrative Services Office has ordered the extension of clinic hours to enable staff of the medical and dental services units to accommodate students and faculty members whose class schedules are beyond the regular class hours.

In terms of services extended during AY 2014-2015, the University can claim that its Medical and Dental Services Units across its six campuses had delivered its services efficiently to both employees and students. The average number of patients served is reflected in Table 12.

The Medical and Dental Services Unit seeks to maintain the excellent quality of the services they extend to the BPSU community. In spite of being able to provide immediate response to medical and dental problems encountered by students and employees, the Medical and Dental Services Units across campuses pursues the continuous upgrading of its equipment and facilities.

Activities, seminars and trainings aiming to raise the awareness and promote the well-being of employees and students are regularly implemented by the Medical and Dental Services Units. Some of these seminars and trainings aimed to teach employees and students on how to properly respond during emergency cases(see appendices for list of activities).

CEA Students' Wireless Coin Deposit Facility Declared Grand Winner in 10th Smart SWEEP Innovations and Excellence Competition

A group of Engineering students won the 10th Smart Engineering Education Program Innovation and Excellence Competition through their invention entitled "Smart Coin Bank-Wireless Coin Deposit Facility for Remote and Rural Locations". The innovation was one of the ten shortlisted products exhibited during Awards Day held on 13 February 2014 at the Makati Shangrila.

According to the product's website, the Coin Saver "promotes developing a habit of saving for Filipinos by dropping coins for products and services that they want or need". The device resembles an ATM which the user, armed with a mobile phone, can deposit coins into and save for a chosen product for a span of at least one month.

Once the amount needed has been attained, the user will receive an SMS voucher to be presented to the store before claiming the product.

Apart from promoting local businesses, the innovation aims to help Filipinos by encouraging them "to save and not to instantly spend". BPSU bested entries from other SUCs such as the Polytechnic of the Philippines, Batangas University University, Wesleyan University, State and Bulacan State University.

As prizes, the students shall receive Php500,000. The school shall also received the same amount to fund the project's realization. Travel expenses to the USA for presentation of the technology is also part of the prize package.

Smart SWEEP Innovation and Excellence Champions Tour Silicon Valley, USA

After being declared champions in the 10th Smart Engineering Education Program Innovation and Excellence Competition through their invention entitled "Smart Coin Bank-Wireless Coin Deposit Facility for Remote and Rural Locations", a group of students, together with their project adviser and the University President, traveled to California, USA on May 12-21, 2014 to tour and benchmark Silicon Valley. The said trip was part of the prizes awarded by SMART SWEEP for the winning group's innovation. The BPSU Team was with City of Balanga Mayor Joet Garcia and otherlocal city officials.

The delegates visited Stanford University, the University of California Berkeley and Silicon Valley. It was remarkable to observe first-hand how technological innovations germinate in these top American universities through the ideation process. The atmosphere of both Universities vibrates with such excellence and fervor that one cannot help but be infected by this positive energy.

Another highlight of the trip was meeting and talking with Filipino innovator Engr. Diosdado "Dado" P. Banatao on 15 May 2014. Dado Banatao is regarded in the world as the "Father of Semiconductors" and the Filipino counterpart of Bill Gates. His words affirmed among the BPSU delegation that we are indeed on the right track by prioritizing engineering, infrastructure improvement, as well as technological research and development.

The experience and insights gained from the trip to Stanford University, University of California and Silicon Valley proved that state universities, especially those from the rural communities, have the capacity to be great feeders of technological experts and innovators. It reinforced the importance of the academe and the government's partnership, and the role each plays in nation-building.

Library Services

Library services, being instrumental to contributing to students' learning, remain as the University's target for improvement. In order to meet the changing needs of library users, the University continues to revolutionize the services of the learning resource centers across its campuses.

The average number of library users per month is 8,281. The University, through the recommendations of the accreditors, has long realized the need to expand the library area in order to accommodate large number of users.

In terms of the number of library resources, LRCs continue to find various means to increase their library collection through purchase or donation of books and other reference materials. In order to attain this, the University sought to partner with public and private agencies and individuals. These partnerships supplemented the University's need for the availability of updated reference materials.

Other than aiming to improve its facilities and its collections, personnel of various Learning Resource Centers had shown desire to improve their professional background through pursuing advanced degrees. Such initiative enabled them to deliver their work efficiently and raised their awareness on the recent developments in library services.

Research and Development

Bataan Peninsula State University has definitely established a reputation for generating excellent quality of multi-disciplinary researches. Over the years of exerting maximum efforts to discover new solutions to current and emerging issues and to make innovations on existing technology, the University, through its Research and Development Office has delivered several contributions in the development of the community.

As the University's research projects and programs continue to make positive impact, news on the astounding results of generated and implemented researches have spread to other communities and this paved the way for BPSU to be recognized by other external organizations. At present, the best practices of the University in research are being benchmarked by other educational institutions and research agencies.

RESEARCHES CONDUCTED

The inquisitiveness of the members of the BPSU community combined with their desire to contribute to the progress of the community continues to result in the generation of several researches in various disciplines. As of FY 2014, the University was able to produce a total offorty five (45) researches, of which fourteen (14) obtain financial support from external organizations and thirty-one (31) are being funded through BPSU-GAA.

Based on the data presented in Table 15, forty seven percent (47%) of researches being

conducted are already completed. However, for externally-funded research the percentage of completed researches is only forty-three percent (43%) compared to completed internally-funded researches which is forty-eight percent (48%). In justification of the number of completed internally-and externally-funded researches, internally-funded researches are often conducted for short periods only while in the case of externally-funded researches they usually have wider scope; thus, requiring more time for the conduct of the study.

One of the primary goals of the University is to generate researches that meet international standards. 

Figure 04 summarizes the research presentations participated in by faculty researchers. For the year 2014, forty-one (41) completed researches were presented to conferences. Since majority of the researches generated during the year fall under the social and behavioural sciences category, majority of the researches presented were social and behavioural sciences followed by agricultural researches.

As the University targets to generate researches which shall have a massive impact on national and international development,

most of its researches also aimed to have their researches presented internationally as such will also pave the way for them to gather suggestions from other experts that would be helpful in enhancing the study. Moreover, the University also looks forward to opportunities of research collaboration with national and international organizations for pooling resources from better institutions and possible sharing of resources to sustain the conduct of the study.

Published Researches

Aside from aiming for research collaborations with other organizations, the University's Research and Development Office also exerts its best efforts to publish the completed researches of faculty and students. Such initiative is undertaken for wider dissemination of the recent discoveries in the various disciplines.

Publication of researches has led to the enhancement of the research productivity in Bataan Peninsula State University. As of FY 2014, seven (7) completed researches were published in refereed journals; thus, increasing the capacity of the University to also increase the possibility to qualify in CHED's accreditation of research journals and obtain incentives.

GMA 7 FEATURES LACAYANGA'S BIOMASS STOVE



Unang Hirit, a morning news and talk show of GMA 7, featured last March 5, 2014 the invention of Engr. Jonathan E. Lacayanga, Chairman for Research and Development and researcher, known as "Vertical-Fed Biomass Cook Stove". The cook stove is environment friendly since it will not emit too much smoke in the air that could be hazardous to the health of the people. Further this is the only stove with a vertical fuel.

In his interview, Engr. Lacayanga divulged his desire to commercialize the aforementioned Biomass Cook Stove as he wants the masses to benefit from this invention knowing that 86% of the households here in the Philippines are using stoves fuelled by woods and charcoal. Moreover, he publicized that he even incited Bataan Peninsula State University to provide funds for the commercialization of the aforesaid stove.

When asked on the price of the Cook Stove, Engr. Lacayanga said that if made from plain galvanized iron sheets, it will cost P 1200. On the other hand, the same stove made of concrete material will be priced from P 900 to P 1000, whereas a biomass cookstove made of clay and plain G. I. sheet can be bought at P 550.

And to inform the public on the operation of the cook stove, Zorille D. Villaflores, Research Staff of RDO Abucay Campus, demonstrated to the viewers how to use the cook stove with the assistance Maribel Ecalla, a housewife.

Concurrently, this cook stove was also featured by Ernie Esconde in The Manila Times dated March 6, 2014 wherein the inventor, Engr. Lacayanga disclosed that when he presented this biomass cook stove in Cambodia, several non-government organizations in Africa expressed their desire to let the said technology to be transferred to them.

Auxiliary Services

Just like any other SUC, BPSU has to create ways to augment the meager budget allocations for its growing operations and to realize or implement infrastructure programs, with that, different income generating projects (IGPs) spread throughout the different campuses of the University are continuously providing support to sustain and realize the University's vast operations year in and year out.

Periodic visits and monitoring to the various IGP projects of the five campuses were undertaken by the Office of the Auxiliary and Entrepreneurial Services (OAES) together with the Office of the Vice President for Research, Extension and Auxiliary Services (OVPREAS). The operations of the IGPs and the income they generate are monitored by each campus' chairperson for OAES, in coordination with the respective project incharge. Income generated in the different campuses usually come from dormitories, canteens, business center rentals, short term courses, and IGPs such as those involving crop production and animal production.

The latter part of 2014 saw changes in leadership and management, wherein the changes became effective at the start of November. Ms. Erlita Z. Lacson, with her 6-year tenure coming to an end, same as those other key officials, was replaced by Mr. Jose Paulo B. Tuazon as Director for Auxiliary and Entrepreneurial Services. Each campus, with the exception of Balanga Campus, also witnessed the changing of management, who together with the Director will be having a 6-month tenure, coinciding with the retirement of University President Delfin O. Magpantay. With that in mind, the group initially targeted shortterm goals, for them to immediately create an impact or address immediate concerns. Still, the group had planned for the long run, proposing several proposals that could be implemented even after April of 2015, or the end of the 6-month tenure of the designated officials. The absence of an Income Generating Project Manual or the IGP Manual of the University was seen as the most immediate issue or concern that needs to be focused on. Once this materializes, this shortterm goal will definitely affect the different IGP operations over the long run. The group already devised standard monitoring and report forms that were immediately adopted by the IGPs.

Main Campus IGPs

The Main Campus houses several IGPs namely the Marketing/Display Center - wherein different novelty items, and "pasalubong" food products are sold, the Foundry Shop - which skillfully transforms scrap cast irons into barbell weights, decorative items and park benches, and the PATVEP Hostel/Canteen - which provides lodging to guests and serves healthy and sumptuous meals. All of the Main Campus IGPs contributed positively in the income generated by the University for the year 2014, as reported by the project managers. The PATVEP Hostel/ Canteen had a net income of Php1,232,469.23 from the canteen sales and Php600,711.60 from the hostel lodging, for a total of Php1,833,180.83. The Marketing/Display Center posted a net income of Php221,859.63, mainly from the sales of NSTP/ROTC-related merchandise and sales from reference books and school supplies. Lastly, the Foundry Shop had remitted a total of Php132,730. Minus production expenses totaling to Php56,059.61, the said IGP had a total net income of Php76,670.39 for the year. However, the perennial problem of the foundry shop is the inventory of finished goods/products, which totals to Php444,443, though they are considered assets, it is better if all IGPs have liquid assets. With that, plans on creating new products that can easily be marketed are in the works and hopefully tie-ups with the local government units (LGUs) can be forged in order for us to fully uplift our incomegenerating capabilities as a university.

Balanga Campus IGPs

For the Balanga Campus, even with the limited area, has business stall rentals and the occasional rental of the covered court. The Balanga Campus' IGPs generated a total of Php56,500 for the whole year. Considering its location, being situated in the central business district of Balanga City, the aforementioned income is very small.

Construction of commercial stalls can surely increase the income being generated by the Balanga Campus, which in turn could help sustain other programs and projects that could not be realized with the budget the University has been allotted annually.

Abucay Campus IGPs

Most of the IGPs in Abucay are agriculture-related. In 2014, the IGPs in Abucay Campus had total sales amounting to Php272,290. Yet, coupled with the expenses, which was Php452,003.85, the Abucay Campus IGPs incurred a net loss of Php179,713.85. This, however, cannot be attributed to poor management since most of the IGPs, especially the greenhouses for the vegetable production IGPs were ravaged by Typhoon Glenda.

Adding to the expenses were the initially-established IGPs like the free-range chicken layer production, broiler production, coconut plantation since these projects are still to make sales by next year. Also, no clear inventory of standing crops and animals were available in 2014, which are considered assets. Hopefully this will be meticulously done by 2015.

A decision was also arrived at, by culling out the so-called IGPs to the real IGPs, meaning that most of the animal production projects that were not contributing to sales will be for instructional purposes since these projects are still very much essential in laboratory classes of the students. By 2015, the total number of IGPs will be thinned down considerably. Clustering of projects into Animal Cluster IGPs, Crops Cluster IGPs and Campus Commercial Affairs will be implemented for a more streamlined management of these IGPs.

Orani Campus IGPs

Typhooon Glenda severely affected the fishpond IGP of Orani Campus, wiping out a big part of the fishpond's levees. Fortunately, the fishponds still managed to generate substantial income every cycle or every harvest season, including the aforementioned cycle when Typhoon Glenda struck. In general, the fishponds were able to generate a net income of Php1,090,732.00 for the year.

Another noteworthy IGP housed in Orani Campus is the Garments Production. In 2014, just like the previous years, it posted a sizeable net income of Php992,445.26.

Other IGPs of the Orani Campus are the Araro Cookies Production (Php28,558.00), the convenience store (Php131,220.00), and the Fish Processing Center (Php71,694.00). For the Araro Cookies Production, backward integration is keenly being proposed for the following year. This means the establishment of an arrowroot production area and the processing of the raw arrowroot into flour.

Dinalupihan Campus IGPs

The main contributor in terms of income generated among IGPs in DInalupihan Campus is the Business Center. Rental of the business center netted Php373,765.00. Together with the rentals on the canteen, chairs and covered court, as well as the other sources of income such as mimeographing and photocopying services, and production of Gender and Development (GAD) training materials, the total income generated by the Dinalupihan Campus is Php548,384.00.

Plans for the next year will be the repair of the business center, and hopefully additional stalls can be established alongside the existing business center since the Municipality of Dinalupihan itself is gradually becoming a highly urbanized area, with numerous bustling commercial centers being established almost every month, attracting investors and entrepreneurs.

Fiscal Management

In order to deflate the ballooning national fiscal deficit, President Benigno S. Aquino III initiated and directed government agencies to do away with the traditional incremental budgeting method used by previous administrations and instead plan the country's expenditures through zero-based budgeting. Thus, the University, with six (6) campuses, adopted the said budgeting scheme in laying out financial plan for its operation.

In the Sustainability Plan, the University prepared the budget for five (5) years to cover the full implementation of the plan. Aside from the actual appropriations for 2014 for Personnel Services (PS) and Maintenance and Other Operating Expenses (MOOE), the University included budget projection for 2015 to 2018.

Budgetary requirement for Capital Outlay will largely depend on the initiatives being implemented by the national government.

Physical Plant and Facilities

BPSU continues to invest in the improvement of its facilities in order to support the highest levels of scholarly research, study, and creative endeavour in the university. thus laboratories, infrastructures, and other learning tools were given priority to meet the students' needs.

This 2014, BPSU has stepped up in undertaking physical development by constrcuting/improving/rehabilitating vital facilities and laboratories for students.

MAIN CAMPUS

Project1: Ceiling Repair (Spandrel Type)

The College of Engineering and Architecture needs of repair specially the rainwater leakage occurred in almost whole of the 3rd floor of the building. The continuous hard rains have put a lot of damages in the outer part of the ceiling making it not presentable. Considering the buildings purpose to house the Engineering and Architecture students, an immediate repair of the ceiling, converting it to spandrel type commenced on February 11, 2014 and have its completion on February 28, 2014.



Project 2: Furnishing of CEA Green Building

The increasing turn-outs of Enrolment of the Architecture Program of the College of Engineering and Architecture in Academic Year 2013 resulted to shortage in the college facilities particularly Drawing/Drafting and Architectural Design Rooms. With the CEA administration's projection for the next academic year to house a bigger enrolled and subjecting the program for an Accreditation, the project to furnish the Green Building making it fully operational in housing Architecture students started on February 11, 2014 and completed on February 28, 2014.



Project 3: Toilet Repairs

With the continuing increase in the Campus Enrolment, a need to provide better student facilities is one of the main concern of the administration. For the last quarter of 2014, four infrastructure repair projects were funded to answer this concerns. Toilets in strategic locations of the main campus were repaired. The completion of these projects prove the strong campaign of the university in improving the services to its students and employees.



Project 4: Quality Assurance Office

To indicate the university's commitment to continuous improvement, and with a clearly defined mission, vision and principles, the Quality Assurance Office was setup. Formerly known as TanghalLikha Building, the later was then converted into QA Office. For a period of one month, BPSU has now an office which plays a key role in the development, monitoring and reporting of quality across the university.



Project 5: Tourism Classroom

Complying with the Commission on Higher Educations and AACCUP Accreditation Survey Results of having a well-equipped Physics and Chemistry Laboratories, the former Science Building is presently under construction converting the area into 2 Two-Storey Laboratories. Not to halt the academic operations of the university, a Three Classroom was built in the ground floor of the Tourism Building to house all affected classes in the Science Building.

Project 6: Supply Container Van

Another step of BPSU to comply with the AACCUP Accreditation Survey Results of not having a spacious Supply and Procurement Office and Stockrooms, 2 Container Vans which will serve as the University Stockroom were placed beside the Supply and Procurement Office. After a month of its installation, the area is now fully operational and can now house a bigger volumes of supplies needed for the operations of theuniversity.



The PE laboratory was also repaired. The eastside wall was demolished and adjusted to maximize the area. Lights and outlets were installed. Repainting of the room was also done.

The rooms of the CNM Deans Office had been replaced by a good one. The downspout was declogged and the ceiling and wall were repainted.



The broken ceiling of RM 108 had been replaced. A division was made to have a computer stock room. Repainting was done to the two rooms together with the CBA SC office.

The BSN skills Lab A was converted to BSN stock room since it was partly demolished due to the construction of the new building. A new concrete wall was constructed.

Rooms 122 and 123 were converted to CoEd Dean's office and faculty room. The ceiling and walls of the rooms were repainted and the flooring was tiled. A glass division was put up for the Dean's office. A new comfort room was also constructed inside the room. Aircon, lights and outlets were installed.

BALANGA CAMPUS

The Teatro Peninsulares room was repaired. The ceiling was 80% replaced and some of GI roofing were also replaced. The lights were repaired and the busted ones are replaced. The ceiling and the wall were repainted.

The BYC façade was repainted and to maximize its usage, the parking lot was also repainted.

The upper part of the BYC was divided into two rooms which are converted to music room and control room. The ceiling of the music room was tucked with egg trays and the glass wall was covered by insulation. Aircons, lights and outlets were installed. The music room and control room were used as temporary classrooms while waiting for the completion of the new building.



ABUCAY CAMPUS

BPSU Abucay Campus has been working and maintaining the different programs as the mandate by the University. These are programs under the instruction, research, extension and production. Part of the general services has to provide and assist these different programs in attaining their goals and objectives to deliver to services that is necessary to facilitate these activities required in the programs.



The physical plant and engineering services continuously monitors the maintenance of several vehicles in the campus to transport the faculty, staffs and students in different locations and see to it their safety and comfort of the passengers. The services provided by the office are normal routine at the motor pool staff to fix the necessary trouble of any of the vehicles available in the campus. There are also times that if there are major troubles of the vehicle in which this cannot be fixed by this office this will be brought to the nearest service center.

Aside from the service vehicle for transportation, farm tractors and farm machinery equipment is also under the office. These equipment's are fully maintained to facilitate the farm operations in the instructions, research, extension and production in the campus and in the near areas were the farmer beneficiaries are located.

The office is also maintaining the daily cleanliness of the campus by collecting regularly the different waste in the different location like the offices, canteen, and dormitories. This collected waste will be properly segregated at the designated material recovery sites to reduce the waste that will dump in the peat area to protect the existing environment in the campus. Mowing of the road networks and other open spaces was done regularly as part of the maintenance of the campus. Maintenance of the existing water system that provide available daily water used at the dormitories, classrooms, projects and staff house by making the system more efficient and equal distribution based on the need.

The office is also maintaining the different building facilities by repairing the deteriorated components in the structure and replacement of the defective electrical system. Moreover, the construction and concreting of the different projects required in the campus.

ORANI CAMPUS & DINALUPIHAN CAMPUS

Despite of considerable cuts in the national budget, BPSU was able to improve its services to the students by adding structures to BPSU Orani Campus and BPSU Dinalupihan Campus as improving and rehabilitating existing facilities.



Administration

The BPSU Administration is one of the University's powerful arm in attaining its Vision, Mission and Philosophy. As such, considered as indispensable component of the university system providing the university with effective, efficient and economical services relating to personnel, budget and fiscal matters, supplies, infrastructure development and management of equipment, records and security.

HUMAN RESOURCE MANAGEMENT

The Office of Administrative Services – Human Resource Management department is one of the major contributors for the improvement of performance and for the success of the University. The HRMD deals with issues related to people such as hiring, compensation, benefits, performance management, employee motivation and training.

Highest Educational Attainment

The pursuit of professional advancement is at times overlooked by non-teaching personnel. Hence, it is noteworthy that there are those who continue to improve themselves; knowing that enhancing their academic qualifications may give them better chance for promotion.

Gender and Development and Human Rights Education

In compliance and support to the international communities and national government's thrust of upholding women empowerment, BPSU has been submitting its annual GAD Plan and Budget since 1995 to the Philippine Commission on Women (then the National Commission on the Role of Filipino Women), way before the former was converted into a University.

ACTIVITIES

Adoption of Gender Fair Language in Official Communication and Proceedings



In compliance with Civil Service Commission (CSC) Memorandum Circular No. 12 dated 30 March 2005, the GFPS-CHRE submitted a proposal to the Office of the President on the use of non-sexist language in all offices' documents, issuances, communications and proceedings.

Immediately upon the approval of the proposal, the Office of the President issued University Order No. 10, series of 2014 regarding the use of Gender Fair Language within BPSU. This furthered the University's aim to be an active agent and primary driver of fair treatment of both sexes and all genders. The issuance stipulates that gender-fair language shall be consciously used in the following official records, correspondence and proceedings:

- 1. Reports, proposals and publications
- 2. Syllabi, handouts, brochures
- 3. Official correspondence and letters
- 4. Institutional issuances such as memoranda, advisories, orders
- 5. Press releases, news articles and writeups
- 6. Official forms
- 7. Oral presentations
- 8. Classroom and office discussions, meetings

A primer on Non-Sexist Language was enclosed with the Order and was widely disseminated among all colleges, offices and units of the University.

Consultation with BPSU Faculty and Employees Association

Responding positively to the invitation extended by the BPSU Faculty and Employees Association (FASSO-FASEA), the GAD Focal Person and the GAD Secretariat discussed in a meeting held on 26 June 2014 pertinent and crucial aspects of the GAD Plan and Budget.

During the meeting, the FASSO-FASEA was oriented on the GAD Planning and Budgeting Cycle based on Joint Circular 2012-01 issued by PCW, DBM and NEDA. Technical aspects such as what can and cannot be charged to the GAD fund were also elaborated. The GPB 2014 was also tackled so that the FASSO-FASEA may be given ideas on possible activities in which collaborations and partnerships with the GFPS-CHRE could be pursued.

The Focal Person and Secretariat also raised some gender issues evident in the University, based on the results of the research the GFPS-CHRE conducted in 2012. The issues raised were followed by recommendations on strategies that can be undertaken by FASSO-FASEA to address the same.

GAD Agenda

To ensure that the efforts to address all priority areas of concern in GAD mainstreaming are sustained and progresses upward, the GFPS-CHRE finalized the BPSU GAD Agenda 2015-2018 which was initially drafted by PCW after the Training on Gender Analysis and Planning and Budgeting.

The GAD Agenda is consistent with the BPSU Strategic Plan 2014-2018 which identifies GAD as its own key result area, and where BPSU targets to be a Regional Resource Center by 2018. As the University has been evaluated to be at Stage 3 in mainstreaming GAD, the Agenda—once fully implemented—shall undoubtedly bring BPSU to Stage 4, the highest stage of mainstreaming.

Scouting for Gender Champions

As part of its strategies to strengthen rights-based Gender and Development (GAD) mainstreaming in the University, the GAD Focal Point System and the Center for Human Rights Education (CHRE) have deemed it crucial to increase the number of GAD primary drivers and human rights educators. For this purpose, eleven (11) select employees across campuses were identified as potential members of the GFPS-CHRE.

Completion and Occupancy of GAD-CHRE Resource Center

After the renovation of the old Commission on Audit Office was completed in March 2014, the GAD-CHRE Resource Center was officially opened and became operational on 08 April 2014. Detailed in the Center is one (1) staff hired specifically and exclusively to provide clerical and operations support to the GAD mainstreaming efforts.

The office, located at the ground floor of the TanghalLikha Building in the Main Campus, provides a venue for GAD activities such as meetings, small focus-group discussions, and accommodation of GAD-related concerns and queries coming from the academic community and those from outside BPSU. Furthermore, the office ensures the safekeeping of records intended for the implementation of gender mainstreaming activities in the University such as IECs, reference materials in printed and digital formats.

Distribution of GAD IECs to BPSU Employees and Students

A total of 59,176 copies of English and Filipino brochures and primers on sex and gender, sexual harassment, violence against women, and the universal human rights were distributed in August 2014 among the University's 17,000 students and 800 employees.

The brochures and primers were the output of the GFPS-CHRE Social Media Working Committee. A copy of each of the three brochures was given to all students and employees. On the other hand, GAD primers were also distributed in all colleges, offices and units.

To facilitate easier distribution among students, the GFPS-CHRE solicited the assistance of the student leaders. Meanwhile, IECs for the employees were coursed through the respective heads of offices.



GAD Orientation for Incoming First Year Students

Members of the GFPS-CHRE joined the Office for Student Services in June 2014 for the annual orientation of incoming first year students. Topics on sex, gender and SOGI were introduced to the students enrolled in the many programs offered across campuses.

Students were also encouraged to visit the Resource Center and talk to the GFPS-CHRE Campus teams to address their future concerns and queries related to their GAD and human rights.

GST Modules 1 and 2 for Non-Teaching Employees

A total of 236 personnel successfully completed the first two modules of the Gender Sensitivity Training designed for BPSU Non-Teaching Employeesrolled out in a series of sessions in April 2014. The sessions fostered awareness on matters pertaining to gender equality and rights, served as venue for the non-teaching personnel to share their gender-related experiences and concerns with their peers, and informed them of existing policies and mechanisms on gender and development. Specifically, the following were the objectives of each Module:

Module 1: Sex and Gender

Surface perception on the differences commonalities of males and females and 2. Differentiate and define sex and gender 3. Understand the concept and of gender stereotyping Evaluate the concepts as they establish 4. the difference between sex and gender Come up with ways to counter the negative effects of gender stereotyping

Module 2: Gender Role Socialization

Participants were divided into nine batches of one-day sessions. Campuses hosted the sessions, with GFPS-CHRE members assigned to function as discussants, facilitators, documenters, logistics and monitoring in-charge.

Personnel who were able to complete Modules 1 and 2 shall be included in the roster of employees to take the remaining modules scheduled to be rolled out in 2015.

Rights-based and Gender Fair Handling of Sexual Harassment Cases

In compliance with Republic Act 7877 or the Anti-Sexual Harassment Act of 1995 and Section 4 of Republic Act 6713 on the Code of Conduct and Ethical Standards for Public Officials and Employees—as well as to efficiently implement the BPSU Policy on Sexual Harassment—the GFPS-CHRE conducted on 22 August 2014 Seminar for the Gender-Fair and Rights-Based Handling of Sexual Harassment Cases by the Committee on Decorum and Investigation.

The seminar aimed to capacitate members of the Committee on Decorum and Investigation and select members of the GAD-CHRE with skills on gender-responsive handling of sexual harassment cases. Commission on Human Rights Region III Director Atty. Jasmin Navarro-Regino was invited as resource speaker. The following topics were covered in the one-day seminar attended by 37 participants:

Half of the day was devoted to answering queries from participants. One hour was used to answer questions related to the seminar topic. Afterwhich, the speaker accepted inquiries and clarifications of legal and administrative nature.

GST Modules 1 and 2 for Faculty Members

Part of the targets indicated in the GAD Plan and Budget for 2014 (GPB 2014) is the conduct of seminars and dialogues among the faculty members. The said activities aim to raise the awareness of this sector on matters and concepts related to human rights, as well as inform them of existing policies and mechanisms on gender and development.

In order to implement this section of the GPB 2014, the GFPS-CHRE conducted a series of seminars during the semestral break of AY 2014-2015 among select faculty members across campuses.

In general, the seminar sought to create awareness among the faculty about basic concepts of sex and gender as critical groundworking in order to develop them as gender sensitive professionals and individuals. Specifically, the following were the objectives of each Module:

I t was strategically decided by the GFPS to use the first two modules of the Gender Sensitivity Training Program—which is composed of seven (7) modules—as topics to be covered in the seminar. Such will provide the participants a solid foundation on basic GAD concepts which they will need in order to better understand and appreciate the ensuing topics to be tackled in future seminars.

The following are some of the highlights of the open forum:

2014 Solidarity Roadshow

As a government agency, the University is also mandated to support international and national programs. As such, for 2014, BPSU supported PCW's 18-Day Violence Against Women Campaign; Worlds AIDS Day; and the International Human Rights Day through the conduct of the 2014 Solidarity Roadshow on November 24-December 12, 2014.

In general, the roadshow sought to create awareness and active participation among students in protecting and promoting human rights; putting an end to all forms of violence against women; and eliminating misconceptions and stigma about HIV-AIDS. The roadshow had as its components the Photo Contest and Exhibit; HIV-AIDS Awareness Symposium; Self Defense Classes for Female Students; and the Orientation for Graduating Students. All activities combined, the roadshow was participated by 1,520 students.

108 students participated in the Symposium on HIV-AIDS Awareness on 10 December 2014. The Symposium focused on Article 25 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, which pertains to one's health and wellbeing. An HIV-AIDS medical expert and a representative from a government-recognized peer support group counselor served as speakers for the symposium.

There was a very healthy open forum which ultimately destroyed all misconceptions and addressed confusion among the 108 participants regarding HIV-AIDS.

Meanwhile, the success and positive feedback from the students from the previous year's Self Defense Classes pushed the GFPS-CHRE to conduct the same class once again in 2014. A total of 68 female students joined and completed the Self Defense Class conducted on 11 December 2014 at the Bataan Youth Center in Balanga Campus.

GAD-Funded Livelihood Extension Program

As part of its mandate on extension, the University through its GFPS-CHRE has been directly sourcing from its GAD Fund some community extension programs spearheaded by its Orani Campus.

The program, dubbed as "Kaalamang Pangkabuhayan para sa mga Ginang ng Mangingisdasa Bataan", is an offshoot of the Philippine National Aquasilviculture Program (PNAP) of the Bureau of Agriculture and Fisheries, implemented 2012 with BPSU as one of the partner implementing agencies in Region 3.

During PNAP implementation, extensionists from Orani Campus were able to have informal discussions with the spouses of the fisherfolk. These conversations, along with collection of data about the communities involved in the PNAP project, led Orani Campus to come up with a program that seeks to economically empower the women of various fishing communities in the province.

Technical training on fish processing and packaging, business operations and management were thus conducted on different dates in select barangays. Seed money of ©2,500 per participant is also being given, to be paid for in installments without interest. To date, the program has benefited almost 100 women.





Special Course on Women

The approved BPSU GAD Plan and Budget for 2014 includes activities that aim to establish a Women and Gender Studies program in the University. For the GPB 2015, it was indicated that the program shall be implemented and monitored. These were considered in order to address the lack of Special Courses on Women and Gender in the University's programs, as well as the lack of awareness and appreciation of crucial offices and agencies within and outside the University on the importance of establishing Women and Gender development initiatives.

With the Office of the University President approving the proposal for the Development of Feasibility Study and Academic Modules on Special Course on Women and Gender, select members of the GFPS and CHRE immediately worked on the first identified step which is benchmarking visit to UP as women's studies forerunner. The visit aimed to gather information and insights from forerunners of Women and Gender Studies; collect baseline information and data; and determine the specific issues and areas of concern for the development of the module.

A team composed of seven GFPS-CHRE members visited the UP's Center for Women's Studies, College of Social Work and Community Development, and the Diliman Gender Office on 06 August 2014.

Copies of some pertinent publications, IECs and policies were purchased or received by the benchmarking team. These are now housed at the GAD-CHRE Resource Center.

First BPSU GFPS-CHRE Rights-based GAD Summit: Women in Politics

The Philippine Commission on Women (PCW) and the Commission on Higher Education (CHED) has identified BPSU to be the prime mover of rights-based gender and development mainstreaming by being a Regional GAD Resource Center. Based on this goal, PCW Chairperson Remedios I. Rikken has maintained steady

exchange of communication and coordination with the BPSU GFPS and CHRE, and has been personally discussing and finding ways to establish the branding of the University as a formidable and credible source of GAD and Human Rights Education experts and resources. One suggestion that earned the approval of the GFPS and CHRE body is the conduct of the Annual BPSU GFPS-CHRE GAD Summit, the first of which was conducted on 17 October 2014, with female elected local politicians as the target participants.

Primarily, the First Annual BPSU GFPS-CHRE GAD Summit was along the GPB 2014 PPA of collaborating with the local government units, and conducting activities that shall raise the level of awareness and participation of the community on gender equality priorities and issues.

A total of 63 participants from eight of the twelve LGUs of the province (i.e. Balanga, Limay, Pilar, Orion, Morong, Mariveles, Orani and Dinalupihan) attended the Summit.PCW Chairperson Rikken as the sole speaker discussed the following topics:

- Review: History of Women's Movement
- Struggle for Space and Numbers
- 21st Century is the Century of Women
- The New Female Leadership Style
- Transformative Leadership Framework
- Transformative Learning Paradigm
- Transformative Society
- Power and Politics
- Traditional Politics
- Transformative Politics

The participants were also given ample opportunities to pose their questions, raise their concerns and share their experiences as elected women officials of their respective barangays. They also conveyed the following:

- for GFPS-CHRE to help them share and educate barangays about GAD via seminars and training
- additional seminars not just for elected female officials, but also among men and those who were appointed as treasurers and secretaries
- for a women's organization to be established
- more information about the GAD budget directed toward the barangay captains of the province

As immediate response to the concerns raised by the participants, the GFPS-CHRE considered the same in the special planning session conducted on 18 October 2014. Furthermore, said concerns were also formally communicated to PCW for their action and assistance.

Training of Trainers of Gender Sensitivity Training

After successfully completing the first two capability-building modules required to be GAD Trainers, the GFPS-CHRE went through the Training of Trainers of Gender Sensitivity Training on February 21-24, 2014. Conducted by the Philippine Commission on Women through the Philippine Educational Theater Association (PETA), the GFPS and CHRE members were taught and trained on the methodologies that are deemed most appropriate and effective in the delivery of GAD modules. The following topics were covered for the training duration's first half, using lectures and creative methodologies:

- Module 1: The GST Trainer
- Module 2: Education Philosophies and Learning Principles Underlying GST
- Module 3: Integrating Creative Approaches in GST
- Module 4: Managing the Learning Process

The remaining half was devoted to module making and demo facilitation by the participants based on their group and topic assignments. Each group was given one hour for the demo, which was immediately followed by constructive critiquing of the module and delivery of the lesson/topic. Twenty-two (22) out of the 25 GFPS-CHRE members completed the requirements of the training in terms of full attendance, module development and presentation.

Gender Analysis and GAD Planning and Budgeting

In order for the agencies to fully understand gender and development concepts and how it can be applied and mainstreamed in their agency programs and projects, JCN 2012–01 states that there is a need to strengthen the agency through capacity development activities on GAD, which includes basic gender sensitivity, gender analysis, and GAD Planning and Budgeting.

GFPS-CHRE Some members had several trainings on Basic GAD Concepts and Gender Sensitivity, but it is imperative for them to be capacitated on Gender Analysis, particularly the use of the Harmonized Gender and Development Guidelines and GAD Planning and Budgeting to ensure that gender mainstreaming will be sustained in the agency. As such, the group once again requested the expertise and assistance of PCW to serve as trainers for the Training on Gender Analysis and GAD Planning and Budgeting held on September 24-26, 2014 in Manila among 22 GFPS-CHRE members.

In order to ensure that the training shall address specific BPSU and participants' concerns, PCW sent a Training Needs Assessment Survey Form to be accomplished by all members of the GFPS and CHRE qualified to undergo the Training. Only members who were able to successfully complete the Gender Sensitivity Training in October 2013 were eligible to undergo the Training. The accomplished TNA survey forms were sent via LBC to PCW two months before the training schedule.

Program documents in various aspects of University operations were also sent to PCW as these shall be used as examples in mainstreaming evaluation. Advanced reading materials were emailed to the participants. Training materials from PCW were printed and reproduced, and included in the training kit.

The following topics were covered in the three-day training:

- Preliminaries and Expectations Checking
- Review of Basic GAD Concepts
- GAD International and National Mandates
- Gender Analysis
- Gender Equality and
- Women's Empowerment Framework
- Gender Mainstreaming
- Evaluation Framework
- Harmonized Gender and
 Development Guidelines (HGDG)
- GAD Guidelines for Project Development
- GAD Guidelines for Project Implementation, Management, Monitoring and Evaluation (PIMME)

To apply the concepts of the abovementioned topics and use the pertinent tool, the participants were divided into smaller groups and were given situations for evaluation as sample exercises. Outputs were analyzed and critiqued by the trainers.

It was during the training when PCW subjected BPSU's mainstreaming efforts to evaluation using the instruments. Upon analysis, it was revealed by PCW that BPSU is already at Stage 3 (Stage 4 currently being the highest stage achievable). With only fourteen months of seriously rolling out and implementing the GPB and mainstreaming efforts, this news brought positive validation for the GFPS-CHRE's efforts.

Upon the recommendation of the PCW trainer, the GFPS-CHRE modified the already endorsed GPB 2015 to address the priority areas of concern that were revealed in the GMEF and HGDG evaluations. The modified GPB 2015 were submitted to PCW and once again endorsed by the agency on 05 November 2014.

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Attendance to Various In-Service Education Opportunities

In order to continually update the University on latest issues and concerns in GAD mainstreaming, and to be able to build up the capacity of its members as resource pool, GFPS-CHRE members were sent to other training, course, seminar and conferences sponsored by other organizations and institutions. To wit:

BPSU Achieves Stage 3 Mainstreaming

With only fourteen months of seriously rolling out and implementing the GPB and mainstreaming efforts, the University managed to attain Stage 3 Mainstreaming (Stage 4 currently being the highest stage achievable). This was identified in the Gender Audit Report released to BPSU by PCW after the latter evaluatedBPSU's mainstreaming efforts using the GMEF instrument developed and implemented by NEDA, CHED and PCW.

Furthermore, as relayed by PCW Trainer KatherineViñegas, BPSU is the only SUC in Region 3 to undergo the Training Workshop on Gender Analysis and GAD Planning and Budgeting, giving it an edge over the others. BPSU is also the only SUC to achieve a Stage 3 rating.

Benchmarking and Consultation Visits by Government Agencies

The University has also started to get attention from its peers and other government agencies as an able academic institution when it comes to GAD mainstreaming. After the seminar-orientation conducted upon invitation by the Bataan Water Districts Association (BATAWAD), select BATAWAD officers from visited the GAD Resource Center in the early part of September to further discuss other training and consultation with the GFPS-CHRE so that the water districts in the province may qualitatively comply with the GAD mandate.

Also, a graduate student and community broadcaster from the Nueva Ecija University of Science and Technology visited the Resource Center in November 2014 to collect data and conduct interviews with available BPSU GFPS representatives. She also conducted a phone-patch interview on-air in December 2014 and, along with her radio program co-pilot, asked questions about the University's rights-based GAD mainstreaming PPAs and accomplishments.

Meanwhile, PCW also suggested to the Institute for Women's Studies (IWS) of St. Scholastica's College to coordinate with BPSU on the preparations the latter undertook for the First Gender Summit conducted in October 2014 among elected female officials in the LGUs. Apparently, IWS is also planning to hold a similar event and, upon learning of the BPSU Summit's success, would like to seek the University's assistance on the matter. The initial formal meeting has been tentatively scheduled in January 2015.

Challenges and Reccomendations

Sustainable Development "Development that meets the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs." - from the World Commission on Environment and Development's (the Brundtland Commission)reportOurCommonFuture (Oxford: Oxford University Press, 1987). The awareness of the BPSU community on the present and future condition of the country has led them to deduce strategies that will provide immediate and appropriate solutions to the problems on food safety and security, enhancing indigenous renewable energy source in the domestic energy mix, development of vaccines and diagnostic kits using indigenous materials, disaster risk management, pollution control, and climate change. Income generating projects continue to augment the funds of the University and help it to become self-sufficient through the proper utilization of its resources. However, the University must consider implementing other effective methods that will increase the profits obtained from its IGPS and make up for the loss experienced in other projects.

BPSU identifies goals, objectives, performance indicators, targets and strategies, and output for executive administration, instruction, research, community extension, and partnership with other institutions. The specific goals for each of these are:

Executive Administration: to entrench the ideology of sustainability that will uplift the University's goals and strategies.

Human Resource Management: to ensure that the university is manned with professionals who possess the drive, skills, and attitude to work towards the best interests of the University and the community .

Instruction: to strengthen academic programs, to improve the educational qualifications of the faculty, and to continue the production of highly qualified and competitive graduates.

Research: to produce researches that are relevant, responsive, and complementary to the development of the country thus providing solutions to the present and future economic problems.

Community Extension: to make the University the prime mover in the development of the different communities in Bataan making it arobust, equitable, and sustainable society.

Bataan Peninsula State University continues to traverse the path of "sustainability" that will able it to materialize all of its goals and also uplift the community
